



Analysis and discussion of marine protected area governance (MPAG) case studies: Challenges of decentralisation in the shadow of hierarchy

The webinar will draw on a recent paper which employs the theoretical concept of coevolutionary governance and the MPA Governance analysis framework to analyse these case studies. Coevolutionary governance represents a progressive reinterpretation of the concept of polycentrism, evolving it to be a more realistic institutional analysis concept. The coevolutionary governance concept focuses particularly on the synergies between different governance approaches, the strengths of one approach counteracting the weaknesses of the other. It follows that the MPAG framework also particularly focuses on the ways in which different incentives interact and coevolve, in keeping with the synecology approach introduced above. This is analogous to synecology in life sciences, whereby the focus is on the ways in which different species interact to constitute a structurally and functionally integrated, diverse and resilient ecosystem. It is now widely recognised in studies of ecosystems that a diversity

Similarly, the coevolutionary governance concept recognises that a diversity of incentives from different categories representing different governance approaches tends to confer resilience to the governance framework and related social system, reducing impacts and thereby promoting effectiveness as well as increasing the flow of ecosystem services. Recognising this, the distinction between governance approaches becomes blurred and arguments about which governance approach is ‘best’ or ‘right’ become irrelevant, as the focus of coevolutionary governance is on how a diversity of governance approaches develop in such a way that they are integrated and coevolve, so that the weaknesses of one approach are balanced by the strengths of other approaches in a synergistic manner.” The concept of ‘governance in the shadow of hierarchy’ is employed to explore how “coordination can be achieved and conflicts addressed through the reconfigured role of the state, providing steer through governance in ‘the shadow of hierarchy’.

Podcasting: scholarship, method, and storytelling in the age of digital and distance research



Scholarly podcasts are on the rise, but could this approach to knowledge mobilization also be an emerging qualitative method?

Podcasting as a method for knowledge mobilization in science has become increasingly popular in the last few years, as academics searching for more effective ways to share their work and engage non-scientific audiences. The Coastal Routes project team has found that podcasting can also be a research method in and of itself, building on a long tradition of story-as-research in the social sciences. Given the new pandemic-imposed realities of doing work from a distance, podcasting represents an important opportunity – and perhaps vehicle – to connect with communities, collect data, and maintain the intimacy and authenticity that makes human social research so impactful.



aim is to explore human connections to the sea and document stories of hope for the global issues we are facing on our local shores. Working at the intersection of nature and society, we will turn our sailing vessel into a floating think tank and lab for ocean solutions, pushing the boundaries of scientific research, storytelling and marine conservation in a dynamic, carbon-neutral format.

Our core team consists of four women from Oxford's MSc in Biodiversity, Conservation, and Management program: a human geographer, an anthropologist, an economist and a journalist. 
